

Bukola's Triumph: From Trauma to Triumph

Bukola, a 15-year-old orphan living in Osogbo, Nigeria, demonstrates triumph from trauma. As the eldest of four orphaned siblings living with their elderly and impoverished grandparents, she bore the brunt of their emotional abuse. The constant verbal assaults and lack of support pushed Bukola to the brink, making her contemplate leaving home.

However, a ray of hope shone through when Bukola was introduced to the CDC-funded Sustainable Programs for HIV Epidemic Control and Equitable Service Delivery (SPEED) Project implemented by ECEWS. Through the project, she was enrolled in a sewing course, learning valuable skills that would empower her. ECEWS, committed to empowering the communities it serves, provided Bukola with the necessary tools and support to develop her potential.

After completing the sewing program, ECEWS provided Bukola with a sewing machine, enabling her to start her own business. Her newfound ability to generate income not only improved her relationship with her grandparents but also allowed her to support her younger siblings. She was able to contribute to household expenses and help her brother with transportation costs for his shoemaking classes.

With each successful transaction, Bukola's confidence grew. She realized that her skills and determination could lead to a brighter future. Inspired by her progress, Bukola set her sights on financial independence and began saving for her aspirations.



Restoring Hope, Empowering Edidiong

The Excellence Community Education Welfare Scheme (ECEWS), funded by PEPFAR through USAID, is a lifeline for vulnerable populations in Nigeria, particularly those living with HIV.

ECEWS's client-centric, holistic care model goes beyond medical treatment, addressing the social and psychological needs of individuals, especially those with advanced HIV who are at high risk. One such person, Edidiong, a 26-year-old aspiring hairdresser, fell seriously ill in January 2024. After seeking ineffective remedies and being told her illness was the result of witchcraft, her condition worsened.

In April 2024, ECEWS healthcare workers diagnosed her with advanced HIV during a community-based outreach in her hometown of Udung Uko, Akwa Ibom State. Initially reluctant to accept the diagnosis, Edidiong refused treatment, believing in the spiritual cause of her illness.

ECEWS took a compassionate, tailored approach, providing her with weekly home visits, psychosocial support, and counseling. As her health improved, Edidiong began adhering to her HIV and tuberculosis treatments. Today, her health has dramatically improved, and she is regaining her strength, confidence, and hope for the future. Edidiong's journey highlights ECEWS's commitment to providing comprehensive care to people living with HIV, transforming lives through support and compassion.





A Journey from Hardship to Hope

At the tender age of six, Itunu's life had already been marked by profound loss. Her mother passed away during childbirth, leaving her without parents. This early vulnerability presented numerous challenges, especially as she was being cared for by her grandmother.

However, a significant turning point came when Itunu and her grandmother encountered the US CDC-funded Sustainable Program for HIV Epidemic Control and Equitable Service Delivery (SPEED) Project, mplemented by the Excellence Community Education Welfare Scheme (ECEWS). This intervention, strengthened by the collaboration of dedicated partners and the generosity of donations, offered a crucial helping hand. One of

the most immediate and impactful changes was the provision of a wheelchair for Itunu. For a young child, mobility is crucial for exploration and development. The wheelchair provided Itunu with a newfound sense of independence, allowing her to engage more fully with her surroundings. "Now I can go play with the other children," Itunu would excitedly say, her small face beaming.

The intervention also focused on empowering Itunu's grandmother, her dedicated caregiver. By providing resources and support to enhance her small provision store, the project helped create a more stable and secure home for Itunu. "Before, I just sell small-small things, and sometimes we no get enough," her grandmother shared, her brow furrowed at the memory of those difficult times. "But now, with their help, my business dey grow, and I can take better care of my granddaughter and even send her go school."

Itunu's story, even at such a young age, beautifully illustrates the profound impact of compassionate and well-directed support on vulnerable children and their caregivers, especially within the context of limited educational opportunities for the guardian.

Her journey from early hardship to one filled with greater mobility, educational opportunities, and a more secure home environment underscores the power of community-based interventions. ECEWS, through the SPEED project, continues to be a beacon of hope for many families in Niģeria, demonstrating the remarkable difference that can be made through equitable service delivery and genuine care that understands and addresses the unique challenges faced by individuals within their specific circumstances.





A Stitch in Time: Idiodo's Tailored Triumph

Idiodo Akpoduado, a seasoned tailor from the heart of Delta State, Nigeria, once found himself entangled in the threads of adversity. Years of financial hardship had frayed the fabric of his family's life, forcing his children out of school and his business to the brink of collapse. But fate, it seemed, had a different pattern in mind. In 2023, a lifeline appeared in the form of the SPEED project, a beacon of hope for countless Nigerians. This project, funded by PEPFAR through the United States Centre for Disease Control and Prevention (US-CDC implemented by the Excellence Community Education Welfare Scheme (ECEWS), prioritizes empowerment of the Government and community stakeholders towards reducing HIV incidence for at-risk populations.

Recognizing Mr. Akpoduado's potential, the SPEED project provided him with a much-needed boost. A fresh supply of vibrant male fabrics was delivered to his humble shop, igniting a spark of hope and determination within him. With renewed vigor, he began to meticulously craft garments, each stitching, proof of his resilience and skill.

As his reputation grew, so did his clientele. Customers from far and wide in Warri environs sought out his expertise, drawn to the quality and style of his work. His business, located at No. 105 Ovie Street in Ovwian community, became a bustling hub of activity. The financial windfall from his thriving business

The financial windfall from his thriving business allowed Mr. Akpoduado to provide for his family's needs. His children, once confined to the shadows of poverty, were enrolled back in school, their futures now bright with promise. The once-empty dinner table is now laden with nourishing meals, a testament to the transformative power of the SPEED project.

Mr. Akpoduado's story is more than just a personal triumph; it's a testament to the power of human potential and the impact of well-intentioned programs. By empowering individuals like him, the SPEED project is not only uplifting lives but also strengthening the fabric of society.





Empowering a GBV Survivor: A Tale of Resilience and Recovery

Socioeconomic challenges create a breeding ground for gender-based violence, especially among vulnerable communities. In Nigeria, the recent economic hardship has pushed many families into poverty creating an atmosphere for the negative coping mechanism among members of the community and, leading to the unintended neglect of minors by struggling caregivers. Threeyear-old Justina (real name withheld) was a victim of this situation. While her mother was out working to provide for their family, Justina was sexually assaulted by a stranger.

Justina's mum had stepped out for a few minutes to purchase supplies for the household when she returned to find her child missing. Panicstricken, she began searching for her daughter with her heart pounding in her chest. "I knew

something was wrong as soon as I entered the house," Justina's mum recalled. "My child is always happy to welcome me. But there was only silence." Her search led her to the compound's public toilet, where she witnessed a horrifying scene. A stranger was emerging from the toilet, zipping up his trousers, carrying her three-yearold daughter, Justina. The child was visibly distressed, and Justina's mum could see blood on her clothes. "I couldn't believe my eyes," Justina's mum said. "I t felt like a dream." Without hesitation, Justina's mum confronted the stranger and demanded that he return her daughter. The man fled, leaving Justina in her arms. She rushed the child to the hospital, one of the facilities supported by the CDCfunded Sustainable Programs for HIV Epidemic Control and Equitable Service Delivery (SPEED) Project implemented by ECEWS.

At the hospital, Justina was examined and found to have suffered a traumatic assault. She received immediate

medical attention and was provided with essential psycho-social therapy to help her healing process from the ordeal. The ECEWS SPEED project also provided Justina's mum with economic empowerment when she was enrolled in lifeskilled building activities at the safe space, she went through coaching sessions and learned how to operate a grinding machine, after graduating from the program, she was empowered with the grinding machine as part of ECEWS family support system intervention.

This economic empowerment has provided the family with an income-generating opportunity for the improved well-being of the entire family. Her unwavering determination together with the support she received, helped Justina heal and rebuild her life. "I am incredibly grateful for the help that ECEWS has given us," Justina's mum said.

Over the past year since the incident, Justina's mum has been able to improve her family's financial status. The grinding machine has enabled her to provide services to the neighborhood, leading to increased income.

With Justina's mum's new found financial stability and with the aim of reintegrating Justina back into the society to help her healing process, she has been able to enroll Justina in a nearby school. This has allowed Justina to interact with other children and develop essential social skills as a positive coping mechanism and improved self-esteem, she has become more confident and outgoing, and her trauma-related symptoms have significantly improved.

This story shows how societal support can improve the resilience of survivors of aenderbased violence. Justina's mum has been able to overcome adversity, provide a safe and nurturing environment for her children, and build a brighter future for her family, with support from the CDCfunded ECEWS SPEED Project,

Ediye's Health & Hope: Overcoming HIV, TB, and Anemia

Ediye quote, "I feel great. When I returned from the hospital, everyone said I look and feel fresh, and my chest no longer pains me as it did before."

Ediye, a 14-year-old from a small village in Akwa Ibom State, faced numerous hardships, growing up without his parents and under the care of his elderly grandmother. His life changed when, after frequent illness, he was diagnosed with HIV in 2021 and began antiretroviral treatment (ART). Support from caregivers and the Orphans and Vulnerable Children (OVC) program helped him attend school, and his grandmother started a business with a conditional cash transfer.

However, Ediye's health worsened when he was diagnosed with tuberculosis (TB). He received free TB treatment through the PEPFAR-supported program of KNVC and recovered in August 2022. In early 2023, he experienced a setback with severe anemia, bronchopneumonia, and recurring TB. Thanks to the Enhanced Expert Support Initiative (E2SI), he received specialized care, including blood transfusions and medications. Ediye made a full recovery and now enjoys good health and a hopeful future, expressing gratitude for the life-changing care he received.



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Iwebi was enrolled by one of our Community-based organizations, the Nigerian AIDS Counselling Organization (NACO) in 2024, after careful assessment and profiling. She was then supported with a startup fund to bolster her cooking business. Armed with this financial support, Iwebi embarked on a culinary journey that would transform her life. With renewed vigour, she expanded her business offerings, providing a diverse range of delectable snacks. Her culinary creations quickly gained popularity, attracting a growing customer base. As her business flourished, her family's financial situation improved significantly. The once-strained household now enjoys a sense of security and prosperity.

To further solidify her financial future, Iwebi was provided with robust financial education and linked to a Village Savings and Loans Association (VSLA). This membership has provided her with access to both savings and loan opportunities, allowing her to further invest in her business and secure her family's well-being.

Iwebi's story is a testament to the power of empowerment. Through the SPEED project's targeted support, she was able to turn her culinary passion into a thriving business. Her journey showcases the transformative impact of the program on individuals and communities alike.



From Crisis to Hope

How ECEWS' Enhanced Expert Support Initiative (E2SI) is helping people in remote locations triumph over adversity

Joy is a bright 13-year-old girl who lives with her widowed mother and two siblings in a small household. Four years ago, she was diagnosed with HIV and was receiving treatment at Mkpat Enin Primary Health Centre, until 30th August, 2024 when her health took a turn for the worse. She was rushed to the health centre with complaints of shortness of breath, a rapid heartbeat, coughing, and fever. Realizing she was found to be in a critical condition, the health team immediately rushed her to Sacred Hospital in Ukam, where she was given oxygen and blood transfusion, after conducting some tests

Recognizing that Joy's condition required more specialized care, the health facility engaged the Enhanced Expert Support Initiative (E2SI) for support. The E2SI is an initiative of the USAID-funded ECEWS ACE-5 project in Akwa Ibom and Cross River State that connects health experts at tertiary hospitals with healthcare providers at primary health centers to improve the clinical management of HIV and its comorbidities. An expert pediatrician from the University of Uyo Teaching Hospital (UUTH) was called in to assess her. After a thorough evaluation, the pediatrician diagnosed her with severe anemia and bronchopneumonia, with the possibility of tuberculosis, all occurring in the background of Advanced HIV Disease (Stage 3). Further tests showed she also had malaria and a urinary tract infection. A comprehensive treatment plan was developed that included intermittent virtual check-ins on her by the paediatrician. After five days of following the prescribed treatment plan, Joy was doing very well and was discharged with oral medications.

Joy's journey from the brink of crisis to recovery is a testament to how timely and expert care, can change the fortune of those in the most vulnerable situations, giving them hope and healing. The Expert Support Initiative ensures that no child should face such challenges alone.

How Margaret grew her business from reselling crayfish on credit to buying in bags and reselling to customers.

Margaret Jonah, a determined widow and mother of seven from Uruk Uso village in Abak LGA, has faced the tough realities of poverty with profound strength. For years, she made a living b y selling Bonga fish (Ibat) on a small scale, often buying on credit. Each sale brought her a modest profit of around N1,000 which was enough to feed her children and keep going, but not enough to break free from financial struggles.

Everything changed when Margaret received an empowerment grant from ECEWS, through the Nka Uforo Iban Women Empowerment Project.

This grant gave her the boost she needed to transform her business. With the additional capital, she expanded her operations by purchasing a variety of fish and crayfish in bulk. "I can now buy crayfish in large quantities, cover my business expenses easily, and make more profit." Margaret said happily. This reduced her costs, increased her profit margins, and helped her build a more sustainable business.

Today, Margaret no longer buys on credit or struggles with debt. "I can now buy crayfish in large quantities, cover my business expenses easily, and make more profit," she shares with pride. Thanks to the support she received, Margaret achieved financial stability and created a better life for

herself and her seven children. Margaret's story is a significant example of how strategic support can empower women to overcome challenges, grow their businesses, and build a future of family. Her unwavering determination together with the support she received, helped Justina heal and rebuild her life.



Victoria's Flourishing Market Stall: A Story of Resilience and Empowerment



In the heart of Ifiayong Usuk community, Ifiayong-Uruan, Uruan LGA, resides Victoria Victor Ime, a woman whose story embodies resilience and the transformative power of empowerment. Seven years ago, Victoria's life took an unexpected turn when her husband left, leaving her to single-handedly care for their family.

Undeterred by this challenge, she embraced the responsibility of providing for her children, starting by selling small goods at the local Idu-uruan market.

Victoria's entrepreneurial spirit ignited further when she received a 100,000 seed grant through the ECEWS Nka Uforo Iban Market Women Empowerment Project. This pivotal moment, coupled with the project's training opportunities, allowed Victoria to expand her business significantly. Her small stall, once offering only basic necessities, now boasts a vibrant array of foodstuffs, a testament to her hard work and the project's support. During a joint monitoring and evaluation visit to the Idu-Uruan market by

ECEWS and the Nka Uforo Iban team, a grateful Victoria shared how the grant had been instrumental in the remarkable turnaround of her business. Her flourishing market stall stands not only as a source of income, but also as a symbol of her strength and determination.



Finding Relief: Ebere's Health Journey



Ebere quote "Your medicine is amazing and powerful! Look at me now, I will never stop taking it."

Ebere, a young woman facing persistent health challenges, struggled for a year with frequent hospital visits and mounting medical expenses. Despite her efforts, her health continued to decline until she visited the Primary Health Centre in Ikang, Bakassi LGA, supported by the ECEWS ACE-5 project. There, the healthcare team worked collaboratively to provide her with free, enhanced care. After undergoing testing and counseling, Ebere was diagnosed with both HIV and tuberculosis (TB) and immediately started on antiretroviral therapy (ARVs).

Just two weeks after beginning her ARV treatment, Ebere returned to the health center with newfound strength and a positive outlook. Grateful for the support, she shared her enthusiasm with the healthcare providers, expressing amazement at how the medication had transformed her health. Her smile and testimony were clear indicators of her improving well-being, as she proudly stated she would continue her treatment.





Olusiji's Story of HIV Resilience & Anti-Stigma Advocacy

In May 2019, 53-year-old Olusiji received a lifealtering HIV positive diagnosis at Ondo State General Hospital, Akure. This news plunged him into despair, leading to declining health, a significantly low CD4 count, and severe depression that ultimately cost him his job. The mental toll was so profound that he neglected his vital antiretroviral (ARV) medications, further jeopardizing his health.

The stigma surrounding his HIV status proved to be an equally devastating blow. Friends and even close family members recoiled, their judgment driving him to seek solace and solitude in his village, believing it would be his final retreat. Non-adherence to medication led to the progression of his condition to Advanced HIV Disease (AHD).

A turning point arrived with the unwavering support of a compassionate friend. This individual's encouragement was the lifeline that guided Olusiji back to care and consistent medication adherence. However, the persistent sting of stigmatization in Ondo State remained a significant challenge. In 2021, seeking a fresh start and continued access to care, Olusiji transferred his clinic from Akure, Ondo State, to General Hospital in Emure, Ekiti State, initially receiving support from APIN.

Late in 2022, the Excellence Community Education Welfare Scheme (ECEWS), through the Sustainable Programs for HIV Epidemic Control and Equitable Service Delivery (SPEED) Project, became Olusiji's steadfast ally. Under ECEWS's comprehensive care, with consistent access to ARV drugs and unwavering support from friends and other partners, a remarkable transformation unfolded. Olusiji's health rebounded dramatically, and the once-insidious virus retreated, ultimately becoming undetectable. Today, Olusiji radiates vitality, proclaiming, "I'm even healthier than I was before I was diagnosed."

Olusiji's inspiring story extends far beyond his personal triumph. Following his relocation, he seamlessly transferred his treatment to Osun State, continuing his wellness journey with ECEWS's unwavering support. Having bravely overcome his initial challenges, Olusiji now shares his powerful narrative.

Both ECEWS and the Osun State Ministry of Health have provided crucial platforms to amplify his voice. Further support from networks such as the Network of People Living with HIV (NEPWHAN), the Association of Women Living with HIV/AIDS in Nigeria (ASWHAN), the Adolescents and Youth in Nigeria (AYPIN), and the Civil Society for HIV/AIDS in Nigeria (CiSHAN) have offered additional avenues for him to share his experiences.

Actively collaborating with organizations like the Garnet Youth Development Foundation, Olusiji lends his voice to vital advocacy efforts. He is dedicated to dismantling the pervasive stigma surrounding HIV and inspiring countless individuals towards testing, consistent treatment adherence, and a future unburdened by their HIV status. His legacy is not merely one of survival, but a powerful and spreading wave of hope and understanding, transforming lives and perceptions within Osun State, Nigeria, and beyond.

ECEWS remains committed to providing comprehensive support to vulnerable populations across Nigeria, ensuring access to essential healthcare services, promoting overall well-being, and fostering resilient communities where individuals can thrive, regardless of their health status.



The flag-off ceremony, led by Prof. Umoh and Permanent Secretary Lady Rose Bassey, was attended by school management, staff, and community stakeholders. Their presence underscored a shared commitment to advancing educational development in the state.

Ebonyi State's Health Insurance for HIV/TB patients strengthened by Global Fund through ECEWS

The Ebonyi State Health Insurance Agency (EBSHIA) convened a twoday stakeholders' meeting aimed at advancing the enrollment of People Living with HIV (PLHIV) and drug resistant Tuberculosis (DR-TB) patients into the state's health insurance scheme, with funding support from the Global Fund the initiative targets 29,373 beneficiaries and is expected to run through 2026. The meeting brought together key partners, including representatives from Excellence Community Education Welfare Scheme (ECEWS), to strategize on effective implementation. Discussions centered on the identification and enrollment of eligible PLHIV, strengthening data-sharing systems between service providers, and intensifying community engagement to boost enrolment, particularly as most antiretroviral therapy (ART) sites in the state have now bee accredited by EBSHIA. Under the scheme, beneficiaries will have access to a comprehensive health insurance package covering routine investigations and essential healthcare services, excluding cancer-related treatments. Enrollment has already commenced; a valid National Identification Number (NIN) is required for registration. Moreso, Day two (2) of the meeting featured group work on the ongoing protocol development for the evaluation of the phased rollout and operations (ETC). Each on the use of Tenfovir alafenamide (TAF) + Emtricitabine (FTC) + Dolutegravir (DTG) for treatment-naive PLHIV. This study will be conducted across 13 ART centers representing the six geopolitical zones of Nigeria. ECEWS is committed to supporting sustainable health financing solutions that improve access to care for vulnerable populations, including those living with HIV and





ECEWS Block Grant Initiative empowers Orphaned and Vulnerable Children through Education in Delta State

In its mission to combat HIV/AIDS, ECEWS with support from the United States Centre for Disease Control (US CDC) through the Sustainable Program for HIV Epidemic Control and Equitable Service Delivery (SPEED) project introduced a Block Grant Initiative for orphaned and vulnerable children in Delta State. This initiative, which is implemented through Community-Based Organizations (CBOs), is focused on improving school infrastructure, fostering an environment for academic growth and creativity, and providing high quality education, including school fee waivers for these children. As part of this initiative, 20 triple-seater desks each were provided to Umutu Mixed Secondary School in Ukwani LGA and Okpe Mixed Secondary School in Agbor in July 2024. The handover events were attended by the representatives of the Honourable Commissioners for Education and Women Affairs Community and Social Development, Dr. Mike Emeshili and Mrs. Emekpe, respectively.

ECEWS Presents 10 Scientific Abstracts at the International AIDS Conference in Germany

ECEWS presented 10 scientific abstracts at the 25th International AIDS Conference in Germany, AIDS2024, which was held from July, 22-26th 2024, highlighting our significant work in HIV epidemic control in Nigeria. The abstracts drew the interest of a wide range of attendees at the conference, notably, the Honorable Minister of State for Health,

Dr. Tunji Alausa, the Director General of the National Agency for the Control of AlDS, Dr Temitope Ilori, and the PEPFAR Chair Dr. Shabeen Ally. The Associate Director for HIV Prevention, Care and Treatment on the ECEWS ACE-5 Project, Dr. Ogheneuzuazo Onwah made an oral presentation showing how the use of a urine-based test improved uptake of tuberculosis testing among children with advanced HIV disease in Southern Nigeria. Similarly, Pharm Sherrif Arthur, a Pharmacy Specialist with the project, also discussed Enhanced HIV Treatment Continuity via Community Pharmacy in Southern Nigeria at a PEPFAR session during the conference.











ECEWS Conducts Free Hydrocele Surgeries to Combat Neglected Tropical Diseases in Cross River State







Neglected Tropical Diseases (NTDs) are a diverse group of medical conditions that affect people living in impoverished communities. Prioritising these communities, ECEWS in collaboration with the Cross River State Ministry of Health, conducted a pilot program to provide free hydrocele surgeries for 10 indigent individuals out of 64 identified cases across four LGAs in the state. This initiative aimed to strengthen the health system by offering necessary surgical interventions for those with hydrocele in vulnerable communities, building the capacity of surgeons in the state, and enhancing the state's healthcare capabilities for integrated disease management.

The intervention took place from July 16th to July 20th, 2024, at the General Hospital in Calabar, with support from various stakeholders and partners. This collaboration is an outcome of the mentorship ECEWS has been receiving from Hellen Keller International in managing NTDs in Nigeria.

Present at the opening ceremony to mark the commencement of the surgery was the wife of the Executive Governor of the State, Rev Mrs Eyoanwan Bassey Otu, ably represented by her Senior Special Adviser on Programs (Dr Mrs Queen Eton Essien), the Director of Public Health (Dr Jonah Offor); the Director of Medical Services (Dr Stephen Agbor), the National Coordinator for NTDs at the Federal Ministry of Health (Dr Fatai Oyediran), Cross River State NTDs Coordinator (Mrs. Veronica Mark), the Medical Superintendent of General Hospital Calabar (Dr. Kenneth Takim), a representative from Research Triangle Institute (Mr Chukwuma Okonkwo), and a representative of Hellen Keller International (Ms Unvime), among a host of others.



ECEWS Hosts 5th CDC Nigeria Biannual Meeting: A Focus on Simplification and Sustainability



The 5th CDC Nigeria Biannual Meeting, hosted by the Excellence Community Education Welfare Scheme (ECEWS), marked a significant milestone in Nigeria's public health landscape. Themed "Strategic pivoting towards program simplification and sustainable public health intervention," the two-day event brought together diverse stakeholders to address critical health challenges and chart a path towards a healthier Nigeria.

Key discussions centered on simplifying healthcare programs, reducing maternal and infant mortality, addressing rising healthcare burdens, and preparing for new health threats. Community engagement, data-driven decision-making, and innovative approaches were emphasized.

Acting Country Director of CDC Nigeria, Suzanne Theroux, called for a coordinated HIV response. U.S. Ambassador Richard Mills Jr. stressed the importance of simplifying health programs for sustainability and state ownership. NACA Director General Dr. Temitope Ilori shared the government's plan to integrate HIV response into national structures.

The event also focused on state-led HIV workplan implementation, the role of state health ministries in outbreak responses and data management, and the potential of health insurance and program simplification for sustainability.

This biannual meeting, hosted by ECEWS, serves as a crucial platform to drive progress, foster innovation, and ensure a healthier future for Nigerians. By fostering collaboration and knowledge sharing, the 5th Biannual Meeting aimed to strengthen Nigeria's public health system and improve the lives of millions.











ECEWS Supports 5-Day Free Medical Outreach Organized by Hon. Moses Essien, Ibiono Ibom Constituency

The ECEWS ACE-5 Project partnered with Hon. (Comrade) Moses Essien, a member of the Akwa Ibom State House of Assembly, to provide free medical outreach services for people in Ibiono Ibom LGA. The outreach, which was held at the Health Center in Ikot Uba, Ibiono Ibom LGA between August 5th to August 9th, 2024, saw over 700 persons receiving care, including surgeries, blood pressure checks and treatment, blood sugar checks and treatment, deworming of children, malaria rapid diagnostic testing and treatment, HIV testing and counseling, eye examinations with the provision of eyeglasses, and general medical consultations.

This collaboration is a further demonstration of the ECEWS ACE-5 Project's commitment to improving community health and strengthening the health system in Akwa Ibom State.



ECEWS Hosts Abbott's Molecular Team, Explores Diagnostic

ECEWS had the pleasure of hosting Abbott's Molecular Team at its headquarters in Akwa Ibom State. Led by Mr. Sanjay Rudnath, Africa Director, the Abott Molecular Team were warmly received by the CEO, ECEWS, Dr. Andy Eyo. The team's visit aimed to foster collaboration and explore growth opportunities. The Abbott Director expressed his appreciation for the organization's significant world-class investments in laboratory services in Akwa Ibom State made possible through the PEPFAR/USAID-funded Accelerating Control of the HIV Epidemic (ACE-5) Project. The discussion also centered on expanding diagnostic capabilities at molecular laboratories supported by the project, leveraging Abbott's cutting-edge Alinity M analyzers. Excellence Community Education Welfare Scheme (ECEWS) looks forward to continued partnership with Abbott, empowering communities and enhancing health outcomes.



Scaling Up PMTCT Services: Activation of Five Community Birth Centers In Akwa Ibom State



The National AIDS and STI Control Program (NASCP) has identified the Prevention of Mother-to-Child Transmission (PMTCT) of HIV as a key priority in Nigeria's fight against new HIV infections. With Nigeria accounting for the highest number of new HIV infections among children globally, 90% of these cases are linked to mother-to-child transmission (MTCT). Despite ongoing efforts, an estimated 7.7 million pregnant women, with 33% of pregnant women in Nigeria have received antiretroviral therapy (ARV) to prevent MTCT by the end of 2022. This challenge is particularly severe in rural areas with limited access to healthcare. To address this, NASCP, in collaboration with partners like USAID, has developed state-specific strategic frameworks aimed at eliminating mother-to-child transmission (eMTCT) of HIV. These frameworks are designed to improve service delivery in healthcare facilities and communities. However, significant gaps remain, particularly in linking pregnant women in rural areas, including Community Birth Centers (CBCs), to PMTCT services. In Akwa Ibom State, the government with support from **USAID-funded** initiatives like the ECEWS-implemented ACE-5 project, has mapped out over 2,000 CBCs from which the project currently supports 522. The project has been instrumental in addressing this gap, particularly in vulnerable areas. On September 12th and 13th, the ACE-5 project team activated five CBCs in Abak, Etim Ekpo, and Itu Local Government Areas, providing comprehensive HIV testing services to pregnant women and focusing on PMTCT. This activation marks significant progress in expanding PMTCT services to hard-to-reach communities, ensuring that pregnant women receive timely, high-quality HIV testing

and care. A crucial aspect of this initiative was empowering local healthcare workers. Through competency assessments and training on the "5 Cs" of HIV testing (Consent, Confidentiality, Counselling, Correct Results, and Connection to Care), healthcare workers were equipped to deliver compassionate and effective care. Additionally, the team evaluated the physical infrastructure of the CBCs and assessed Traditional Birth Attendants (TBAs) using the Site Improvement through Monitoring System (SIMŠ) and Stepwise Process for Improving the Quality of HIV Rapid and Recency Test (SPI-RRT SPI-RRT) checklist. These assessments identified key areas for improvement, ensuring that services at the CBCs remain safe and reliable. In addition to training, HIV testing commodities were also provided to ensure continuous service delivery. For women like Imaobong Ezekiel from the Imaobong Ekaiko Delivery Home, these CBCs are more than medical centers, they are lifelines offering hope and essential care. However, the activation process faced challenge's, such as flooding, poor road conditions, and long distances between centers Yet, the dedication of the ACE-5 healthcare teams ensured success, contributing to breaking the cycle of HIV transmission in these communities. With continued support from USAID through PEPFAR, the ACE-5 project implemented by ECEWS is committed to working with the Akwa Ibom State Government to expand these services. By empowering healthcare workers like Mary Essien at Ammesdy Homes, and Etimbuk Ime at 'We Care' Medical Centre, ECEWS is helping to achieve the national goal of eliminating mother-tochild transmission of HIV.







ECEWS Receives USAID Mission Director and Her Team on a Working Visit

ECEWS received the USAID Mission Director, Ms. Melissa Jones, and the USAID Nutrition Ambassador, Chioma Chukwuka-Akpotha, who visited Akwa Ibom State from December 1 to 6, 2024. The visit aimed to strengthen ongoing partnerships, showcase USAID's impact on health and nutrition. The delegation engaged with key stakeholders, visited primary and tertiary healthcare facilitiés, interacted with community members, and participated in advocacy and stakeholder engagement sessions.

A major highlight of the visit was the stop at Ikot Ebok Polyclinic, where Mrs. Chukwuka actively participated in community health promotion activities, including a food demonstration on local nutritious dishes. The team also visited the Uyo Base Primary Health Centre, where the Mission Director interacted with community members, inspected key service delivery units, and emphasized the importance of exclusive breastfeeding and proper child nutrition.

As part of activities, ECEWS also organized a Meet & Greet Dinner. This provided a platform for engagement between the USAID Mission Director, USAID Nutrition Ambassador, key state government officials, implementing partners, and civil society organizations. The event fostered deeper collaboration,

highlighted the impact of ongoing interventions, and identified areas for sustained partnership to improve health and nutrition outcomes in Akwa Ibom State.

The visit concluded with a visit to healthcare infrastructure provided with USAID support at the University of Uyo Teaching Hospital (UUTH), including an oxygen tank and a 130kVA solar power system. A debrief session was held at the ECEWS Headquarters, Uyo, where key successes, lessons learned, and next steps were discussed.





ECEWS Participation in the 12th National Colloquium on Mental Health and Development

ECEWS actively participated in the 12th National Colloquium on Mental Health and Development, organized by the Mobile Manna Foundation to commemorate World Mental Health Day 2024 in Akwa Ibom State.

Chaired by Mkpisong (Obong) Ide wodiong-Idemeko, Chairman of the Akwa Ibom Investment Corporation, the event brought together mental health professionals, government officials, and other key stakeholders to discuss pressing mental health issues, including insecurity, depression, and trauma.

Dr. Bala Gana, representing ECEWS, delivered a thought-provoking keynote address on "Mental Health in the Workplace for Those Serving Vulnerable Populations." The address emphasized the critical need to support caregivers' mental well-being to ensure they can continue to provide quality care to those in need. Through interactive discussions and practical sessions, participants gained valuable insights and strategies to improve mental well-being. The colloquium underscored the importance of mental health in promoting individual and community well-being, highlighting the need for expanded mental health initiatives.



Enhancing Healthcare Sustainability through Solar Power Interventions in Cross River State

In line with the ECEWS ACE-5 Project sustainability plans, the project has initiated several solar power interventions to improve healthcare facilities across the supported project states. This includes the deployment of 10KVA inverters with Lithium-ion batteries at four key locations: Calabar General Hospital, Ugep General Hospital, Dr. Lawrence Henshaw Memorial Hospital, and Ekpo Abasi Primary Health Centre. Six solar freezers have also been installed at these facilities to support ecofriendly practices and enable efficient remote sample logging.

Another significant aspect of this initiative involved the installation of a solar inverter at the

University of Calabar Teaching Hospital (UCTH) to provide a reliable power supply for the Serology Lab, thereby improving the efficiency and reliability of critical laboratory operations. The ECEWS ACE-5 team in Cross River also repaired and returned a malfunctioning inverter to Dr. Lawrence Henshaw Memorial Hospital, further strengthening laboratory infrastructure and service delivery. These efforts reflect the project's commitment to promoting sustainable energy solutions and ensuring uninterrupted laboratory operations, ultimately contributing to improved healthcare outcomes in the region.

AviClaire Farms: ECEWS' Newest Addition in the Fight for Food Security



Founded in April 2024, AviClaire Farms is on a mission to promote food security through environmentally friendly agronomic practices and innovative solutions to the challenges posed by climate change.

AviClaire Farms operates a stateof- the-art greenhouse farm designed to provide consistent, year-round yields, defying seasonal and climatic barriers. With four expansive 8m by 24m greenhouses, the farm cultivates a range of crops, including spicy habanero peppers, vibrant bell peppers, juicy tomatoes, and thriving seedlings ready for transplanting. So far, the farm has harvested 3 cycles of 303kg tomatoes, 25 cycles of 3349.36kg Habanero and Bell pepper 20 cycles 1059.22. Additionally, AviClaire offers expert consultancy and brokerage services for greenhouse farming, as well as training and management of greenhouse staff. The farm's commitment to community engagement is evident in its employment of local indigenes. By providing jobs and training opportunities, AviClaire is helping to uplift the local population while promoting sustainable farming practices.

Key highlight of AviClaire's mission was a successful one-day training session held in October 2024, facilitated by a consultant from Dizengoff Nigeria. This training aimed to equip greenhouse farmers, open-field farmers, and agricultural stakeholders in Akwa Ibom State with essential climate-smart farm management techniques, integrated pest management, soil conservation, and entrepreneurship in agriculture. The event attracted 20 participants, including the CEO, Dr. Andy Eyo and Board members of ECEWS, AviClaire's management and staff, greenhouse owners, farmers from Uyo, Ikot Ekpene, and Abak Local Government Areas (LGA), as well as community stakeholders such as Akwa Ibom State Female Farmers Association and representatives from the Akwa Ibom State ARISE Agenda.

Through a combination of expert presentations, practical illustrations, and interactive discussions, participants gained a deeper understanding of the importance of sustainable agriculture and the role they can play in promoting food security. As the management noted, "Our goal is to not only produce high-quality crops but also to contribute to the development of our local community and promote sustainable agriculture practices that benefit both our people and the en vironment."

Overall, ECEWS' continuous support for initiatives that champion food security such as AviClaire Farms, represents a promising step forward. With its innovative approach to agriculture and commitment to community development, as well as commitment to sustainability, AviClaire is helping to shape the future of agriculture in Akwa Ibom and beyond, encouraging a more food-secure and climate-friendly world.





The project is implemented in Akwa Ibom and Cross River States and aims to achieve sub-population control of the HIV epidemic by addressing the barriers limiting access to treatment through high-impact, evidence-based interventions within the focused states. The project supports comprehensive HIV/TB

prevention, treatment and care services in 226 health facilities spread across all the Local Government Areas in Akwa Ibom and Cross River States. This includes HIV case identification and linkage to treatment, adult HIV care and treatment, pediatric/adolescent care and treatment, triple elimination of

mother-to-child transmission (EMTCT) of HIV. Syphilis and Hepatitis B. TB/HIV service integration, cervical cancer screening for women with HIV, screening for non-communicable diseases, laboratory services, health systems strengthening, and private sector engagement, etc.





health facilities, 7 One Stop Shop (OSS), 11 Key Population Community Based Organizations (CBOs), 7 Orphans and vulnerable Children (OVC) CBOs and 9 ART Drop-in-Centers to deliver comprehensive and wholistic services across sub thematic program areas including PMTCT, HIV/TB prevention, care and treatment for Pediatric and Adult sub-populations, Gender-based Violence (GBV), NCD program integration, Mental Health and

Psychosocial Support (MHPSS), Orphan and Vulnerable Children (OVC). To ensure equitable service delivery for all sub-population the SPEED project adopts a Pediatric, Adolescent and Key population friendly service provision model at both facilities and communities. These services are coordinated at both facility and community levels to achieve optimum coverage for beneficiaries across all the LGAs and communities in the three states.



NKA UFORO IBAN PROJECT



In September 2013 – 2014, ECEWS received funding support from Nka Uforo Iban Akwa Ibom State USA Inc. to implement an empowerment project for ultra-poor market women in the Akpan Andem entrepreneurial market, Uyo, and Abak main market. The project's active implementation began with advocacy to relevant stakeholders, community mobilization and sensitization, identification and selection of beneficiaries, capacity building in Basic Business Practices, seed grants disbursement, supporting the market association to achieve minimum operating standards, monitoring, and reporting on the project. The Market Women Association now has a well-documented list of members by group, holds regular executive and general meetings with minutes, and can monitor projects executed to benefit their members.





ECEWS NTD PROJECT

ECEWS commenced a partnership with Helen Keller International – HKI in October 2022, to control and eliminate Neglected Tropical Diseases in Cross River State through preventive chemotherapy and Morbidity Management and Disability Prevention (MMDP). 




